

Youth Social Justice Camp: Education

Overview

The Climate Youth Social Justice Camp is a month-long programme aimed at young people interested in challenging injustices related to the climate crisis and the environment. Over four sessions you will receive training on project creation and design, gain subject matter expertise on the topic of Climate Social Justice, and participate in interactive learning amongst a community of young leaders across Europe. The camp will be hosted across four sessions, starting July 6 and ending on July 15, 2021. The camp is created, facilitated and led by young people from our UK and Europe ambassadors programme.

Peace First will provide young leaders with the opportunity to receive \$250 grants to carry out their project upon completion of the camp workshops. The team will guide people through the grant application process and give assistance where needed.

About the sessions

Each session we have focused on a specific topic related to climate justice, progressing each week so that you can get a clear insight into how to challenge this injustice.

Session One (6th July) - Introduction to social justice relating to the environment.

We will be discussing the issue of social justice within the climate movement, how does climate relate to injustice? What should we do to make our activism more inclusive? How is the climate crisis also a crisis of racial and gender inequalities?

Session Two (8th July) - Action Activism.

Our guest speaker will be encouraging us to examine how Green ideas can be implemented in Eastern Europe. What has been done so far, and how can youth activism be so powerful?

Session Three (13th July) - Food Sovereignty.

We will explore the issue of food sovereignty, what is it and how does it affect all of us? What would our ideal street look like in a climate just world and how can we imagine our communities connecting better to their food and their history?

Session Four (15th July)- Storytelling for the Climate

A discussion of how the climate and food security crises affect certain areas. How can young people make their voices heard in this debate? And how can we be active in other ways, using our creativity and passion?
